'Bringing Your Heritage to Life'

Burnley Blue Plaque School Project

May 19th and 20th saw Fiona McIntyre and Alison Hey deliver sessions to support the News Academy Heritage Lottery project. Before the sessions, held at Burnley Library, children from Cherry Fold and Worsthorne Primary Schools had been working with Lucie Higham from the News Academy on how to be a reporter and write articles. Following on from this, the children were given the task of finding out about the Blue Plaques in Burnley and the surrounding district. Fiona and Lucie took them on a town centre heritage walk looking at 9 of the plaques and the children had to fill in the missing words from the plaque on their worksheets. When they returned to the Library they had a research skills session in the Community History Department looking at resources that would help them to find out more about the plaques. They chose to look at one in particular "The Cattle Market & Gaiety Theatre". The children loved looking at the books, photographs, maps and microfilmed newspapers and discovering how to research and check facts. Booked Family History Sessions

Members of the team deliver events in libraries across the county to people who book to have, one-to-one half hour, sessions to ask about their own family history.

The sessions are aimed at helping either people who are just starting on the journey, or those who have done some research but have reached a dead end.

We show them the online resources which are freely available from library PCs, principally Ancestry Institution, as well as others which they can access from home.

It is very gratifying to see how pleased some people are when, within a few minutes of starting, we have found an ancestor's records which they had been searching for previously but with no success.

One person's great grandfather had an unusual first name, which made searching for him easier, and we even found a picture of his headstone which revealed yet more information about the family.

George Lyon, the Upholland Highwayman

As part of the commemoration of the 200th anniversary of his hanging, Marianne arranged for 35 people, mainly from the Skelmersdale U3A, to go to Lancaster Castle and have a private guided tour.

We saw the actual courtroom where he was tried and condemned to death, the cells in which he was held, the drop room where he was prepared for hanging, and hanging corner itself. It was very meaningful to hear part of the contemporary account of the trial and hanging, and George Lyon's sorrowful last letter to his wife.

As you can see, we enjoyed our visit to the Castle more than the person we were remembering – and we were able to leave afterwards!

Lytham History Walk

Winckley Townscape Heritage and Gardens project celebration event

Townscape Heritage Initiative received over one million from the Heritage Lottery Fund to refurbish key buildings around Winckley Square in Preston and nearby streets, restoring its historic character and supporting ways of adapting property for new use including business, commercial, retail, restaurants and bars. The project also aimed to deliver a schools activity programme. In partnership with Community Gateway Housing Association, Claire Sutton from the Community Heritage Team and Dawn Worthington, Education Officer for the Museum & Art Gallery planned and delivered local history sessions to school children about the history of Winckley Square and its inhabitants. The sessions were split between the Harris Community History Library and the Harris Museum and Art Gallery. In total 135 pupils and teaching staff from local primary and secondary schools engaged with the wealth of resources available at the Harris. The pupils were all working towards their Arts Award and part of the day's programme included a visit to the Square and to Preston Vocational Centre to learn about traditional building processes. A celebration event was held at the Harris on Saturday 27th June which was attended by approximately 70 pupils, parents and teachers. The Mayor of Preston gave a speech and presented representatives from each school with their Arts Award certificates. The artwork produced by the schools is on display at the Harris until 27th July.
